The authors' works base on the complex urban conservation premises because urban areas always been regarded as the government territory, therefore, the perception of the public is that the cost for urban conservation shall be borne by the government monies. However, the findings reveal that people are willing to pay for historical conservation. The findings do bring hopes for better urban historical conservation management in Malaysia. Norhuzailin et al presenting a student studio work in relation to a park development in Bukit Serindit, Melaka. It is the first attempt by ALAM CIPTA to publish a narrative of a student's studio design works. It is our hope that in the future, a design narration article will evolve into a design critique article, in which, the author can be more critical at the theoretical and practical levels of the design. It is very enlighten for us to receive this kind of article by Norhuzailin et al. ALAM CIPTA would like to welcome more articles that critical to design project be it an architecture or design project and either it is based on student works or professional practice works.
